






Total Spent



Back-to-back earthquakes, with magnitudes of 7.8 and

7.5, brought devastation to two countries when they struck southern Türkiye near the northern border of Syria within hours of each other in February 2023.

The quakes killed about 55,000 people, injured close to 130,000 more, destroyed around 300,000 buildings, and left millions of people displaced.

ADRA's response began in the early aftermath with local church volunteers helping to distribute shelter supplies, blankets, food, and hygiene kits. ADRA also helped equip rescue operators with metal cutting tools and other critical resources.

As the response continued, ADRA's assistance evolved from emergency aid to long-term rehabilitation, which included rehabilitating water systems and school buildings.

"After ADRA finished, we returned to the school," said a 9-yearold student of one of the schools affected. "It was much better than before in all aspects – the building, and the teaching! More students now want to come to [my school] and are coming to register!"

EMERGENCY RESPONSE & PREPAREDNESS

Fresh, nutritious produce straight from the field is a delicious kind of success.

The success is even sweeter thanks to ADRA Zimbabwe's ENGAGE project, which is helping farmers learn best practices for planting, harvesting, and selling their products for the best prices possible.

More than 4,000 smallholder farmers and 750 youth are being engaged in horticulture value chains, village savings and loans groups, and micro enterprises as part of the project in the Umguza, Murewa, and Mutoko Districts.

Among those 4,000 are the *ADRA Queens*, a group of women united in a Village Savings & Loan Association (VSLA). After years of living hand to mouth, these ADRA Queens have received training and have been putting their money together to see increased incomes and hopefully increased share prices in the future.

LIVELIHOODS

Under ADRA's pillar of *Health*, mental health continues to be a growing focus.

The effects of poverty, conflict, and crisis are

more than physical, so addressing the mental health needs of those we serve goes hand in hand with ensuring they have nutritious food, clean water, and access to health facilities.

ADRA Yemen's Equal Access to Mental Health Care II (EMHS II) project continued its mission to provide mental health and psychosocial support to internally displaced persons (IDPs) and their host communities in the Lahj and Abyan governorates.

The ongoing project aims to reduce the impact of war on the mental health of thousands of Yemenis by offering counseling, information sessions, and child-friendly spaces for individuals and families.

New books mean new opportunities for young readers, making the launch of a new library something worth celebrating.

In Cambodia, a new library was just one of the updates to a school that was built by, and



continues to be supported by, ADRA Korea and singer Kim Jun-su through the Pursat Child Sponsorship program.

The improvements to the school are making education more accessible for children in the Pursat area as the school seeks to accommodate the growing number of students.

The increased accessibility extends to children with disabilities after a team of ADRA Connections volunteers built a new set of latrines for the school that included disability-friendly facilities.

These enhancements not only improve the learning environment but also promote inclusivity, ensuring that all children, regardless of their physical abilities, have equal access to education and essential facilities.


